At the age of 13, boys and girls are called to the Torah and lead parts of the service. Preparing to be a "son or daughter of the commandments"

is achieved through an individualized study program. As our children grow toward adulthood, we oblige them to understand the central commandment of the Torah handed down by Rabbi Hillel of the 1st century: "What is hateful to you, do not do unto your neighbor." More than learning "about" Judaism, our students are educated to "live" Judaism through a lifetime of kindness and good deeds.
